
## **Mission and Code of Ethics**

#### What Is Placer Gold and Where Do I Find It?

#### Placer Gold: The Stuff You Gold Pan For

To start off, there are two types of gold deposits: lode and placer. Typically, <u>lode deposits</u> are the traditional veins of ore that are embedded in rocks and minerals. To recover gold from lodes, miners have to blast, mill, or treat the rock with chemicals to recover the gold inside.

The process for the creation of placer gold begins when a lode deposit is eroded by weather and environment factors, leaving the "heavier" minerals, like gold, to be transported down a stream or river. Many of the other heavier minerals that erode are also transported with the gold, eventually becoming black sand, which settles on the bottom of riverbeds and depressions. Where there are depressions in a riverbed full of black sand, there is a good chance gold may be there as well!

## **Local Gold History**

#### **HOLCOMB VALLEY**

#### Historical Landmark

How many of you know the history of Holcomb Valley? Here are some tidbits of information. The Valley Prospectors' claim, Miner's Folly resides in Holcomb Valley.

#### **Description:**

Southern California's largest gold rush followed the discovery of rich placer deposits by William F. Holcomb and Ben Choteau on May 4, 1860. Miners rushed to the valley and established boomtowns. Belleville, the largest, rivaled San Bernardino in population and almost became the county seat. Violence and hangings were common in this remote valley. Over time, major placer and quartz mining declined although some activity continues today. Belleville Holcomb Valley, on Rd No. 3N16, 4.3 mi

NW of Big Bear City.



There is a great article about Holcomb Valley at Legends of America. Did you know that Bellville, named after Mrs. Jed Van Dusen's daughter, Belle, almost became the County Seat of San Bernardino County? Due to the influx of miners in 1860, almost 10,000 residents, Bellville was a contender for the County Seat. The City of San Bernardino beat out Bellville by just two votes. Legends of America claims that the Holcomb Valley Gold Rush was the largest in Southern California. I'm not sure how true that is. It seems quite a bit of gold was also found in Mojave (remember the Mojave Nugget) and San Gabriel. Can't find a definite assessment of the amounts in each area.

Both placer and quartz lode mining occurred in Holcomb Valley. Stamp mills were built to accommodate the crushing of the quartz rock material. Two 40-Stamp Mills were built for the Gold Mountain Mine which was situated northwest of Baldwin Lake. I remember dredging in Van Dusen Canyon in the '60s and '70s with

Dick Haskell. We used a small 1 ½" suction dredge he nicknamed Suction Sally. Not much water in the creeks or Baldwin Lake nowadays. Lots of history in our backyard.

#### Miner's Folly Claim, Holcomb Valley, Big Bear, CA

On Oct 28, 2020, Michelle O'Brien, my niece and Valley Prospectors member, and I had the fun task of teaching and showing her son, Evan, and 2 of his classmates (their Kindergarten Pod) all about gold in Holcomb Valley at the club's Miner's Folly claim. Luckily the weather had not turned too cold.





The three boys and their teacher, Ms. Bracker, were so excited. We had special buckets (Trick or Treat variety just in time for Halloween), fake dynamite, and trowels. We told the boys that gold washes down the creek from the rocky mountains and that we were looking for placer gold today (that's loose gold that has been released from the rocks). We showed them how to classify the dirt and then how to pan. We sprinkled special sand in each pan (those \$5 gold bags came in handy). Each one got a big surprise when we panned down to the black sands. Once they all found gold and collected it in their



gold vials, they rushed back to the dry stream and started filling up their buckets again. Even their teacher had a chance to pan for gold. During the second panning session, my grand-nephew, Evan, asked where the special sand was. Can't put anything past these kids.

After a short hike to Jonathan Tibbetts Grasshopper Quarts Hill and a collection of rocks and pine cones, we headed back for a prospector lunch of dried apples, beans, and jerky. Along the way, the boys also feed the birds by sprinkling dried mealworms along the path and eating trail mix to keep up their strength. The

adventure wrapped up with a road trip to see the small cabin on the Holcomb trail. The boys are still talking about their experience. We had so much fun. It was also a great learning experience. They learned about mining claims, claim posts, how heavy gold is, and how to keep our environment safe and clean.
