## Wet vs. Dry Gold: Why Does it Matter?

The image of the grizzled prospector hunched over his gold pan surrounded by a rushing stream is an iconic image of the California Gold Rush and prospecting in general. Many of the Club's claims lay far from moving water, but that won't stop the hunt for gold. The first thing most new prospectors learn is that gold hidden in dry dirt moves differently that gold submerged in water. This is due to a phenomenon called relative density, aka specific gravity. This term seems intimidating, but it can help you understand how the components of gold bearing dirt will move using air or water as a medium. The relative density of the gold to either wet dirt or dry dirt is different and impacts the ease of separating the two substances. This means that gold is more likely to sink to the bottom of a gold pan or riffle box faster and with less work when water is used as compared to dry dirt in the same gold pan or a similar riffle box using a blower.

That prospector in the stream? He's taking the easiest route to the gold. Dry panning for gold is possible but will take more work and time to get the gold properly settled and separated. Ancient desert prospectors used a winnowing method of throwing the dirt in the air using a sheet to let the wind carry off lighter material, similar to grain separation. Lucky for the modern prospector puffers and dry washers vastly increase the efficiency of dry processing. Although, most seasoned gold seekers will recommend running dry tailings through the machines twice to ensure the gold has fully separated. Whether dry or wet, the key components of separation are suspension and motion. The air or water needs to be thoroughly mixed with the dirt in order to assist the gold separating from the other components using its higher specific gravity. The fancy term for this is "liquefaction" and it happens in both wet and dry processing. Blower powered drywashers and puffers suspend the dirt in air to encourage separation of the gold from the host material. Sluices harness rushing water to do their jobs. Choosing the right processing method for your location is the first step towards the nuggets of your dreams.

*Fun Fact:* Specific Gravity is the phenomenon that allows your bartender to make layered cocktails like a B-52 shot or a Tequilla Sunrise.

#### SAFETY SNAKE BITE FIRST AID

**1** Stay calm, get safely away from the snake, and have someone call 9-1-1 (or the emergency number in your area). The less the victim moves the bitten site, the less likely the venom will be spread through the body and cause damage.

**2** Have the victim lie down with the affected limb lower than the heart. Keep the limb immobilized. If practical, splint the limb.

**3** Treat for shock and preserve body heat.

**4** Remove any rings, bracelets, boots, or other restricting items from the bitten extremity. (It WILL swell.)

**5** Apply a light constricting band about 2" above and below the bite, however never place the bands on either side of a joint (such as above and below the knee or elbow). This band should be made up of wide, soft material, which could be a handkerchief or shredded clothing. The band should only be as tight as the band the nurse applies when taking a blood test.

6 NOTE: The purpose of constricting bands is to restrict lymphatic flow, not blood, so they should not be too tight. Check pulses below the bands and readjust the bands as necessary when they tighten due to swelling.7 Wash the bite with soap and water (if available).

**8** If the victim has to walk out, sit calmly for 20-30 minutes to let the venom localize at the site, then proceed calmly to the nearest source of help and try to avoid unnecessary exertion which will stimulate circulation of the venom.

**9** Get the victim to definitive medical care for antivenin, which will provide the greatest relief from the toxic effects of the bite.

**10** Bring in the dead snake only if this can be done without risk of further injury. Do not waste time hunting for the snake, and do not risk another bite if it is not easy to kill the snake. Be careful of the head when transporting it -- a dead snake can bite from reflex for up to an hour.

ACTIONS TO AVOID: **1 DO NOT** cut the bite. The additional tissue damage may actually increase the diffusion of the toxins throughout the body

**2 DO NOT** apply a tourniquet. Such action can result in the loss of the limb.

**3 NEVER** try to suck out the venom by mouth. You can try the suction cup in a snakebite kit if it doesn't delay other needed treatment. Suctioning seldom provides any measurable advantages, however.

**4 DO NOT** apply cold and/or ice packs. Recent studies indicate that application of cold or ice makes the injury much worse.

The recommended treatments presented are those published in the current edition of Brady's Emergency Care for the Sick and Injured, the standard training and procedures manual for Emergency Medical Technicians. This is for informational purposes and no liability is assumed in its use.
