


Find Peace & Healing in a Gold Pan

Southern Californian Gold Discovery March 9, 1842

Before Sutter's Mill Came a Southern Californian Rush to Find All That Glitters

The Oak of the Golden Dream sits beside a quiet stream in what is now known as Placerita Canyon north of Los Angeles, CA. It will surprise all those who studied the California Gold Rush in 4th grade that gold was first discovered in Southern California. A golden treasure clinging to the roots of some wild onions dug up one March afternoon by Francisco Lopez, a local rancher. The year was 1842, six years before gold was found at Sutter's Mill.

With this unexpected discovery by Mr. Lopez, dreams of gold lured thousands of miners who have picked and panned through the San Gabriel Mountains north of Los Angeles, some continuing to the present day. Current restrictions forbid panners and prospectors to work the historical gold fields, but a state park has been created where you can walk a trail in the steps of those first prospectors. Over the years most evidence has been worn away of this forgotten gold rush. For those more adventurous souls who search a little farther afield in the quiet canyons or on treacherous granite ridges, one can still find reminders of a time when hardy souls extracted a living from these mountains.

Placerita Canyon State Park, three miles east of Newhall, is where it all got started. The Oak of the Golden Dream, a twisted old California Live Oak, still stands as sentinel at the west-end of the park, north of the highway. Some old machinery and a small museum mark the site where early prospectors took \$80,000 in gold out of this canyon. A small

stream runs only a few months each year and was bone dry this past July, the fifth straight year of drought in the state.



Lack of water was a major obstacle for the placer miners of the 19th century. The Mexicans who did most of the mining in Placerita and nearby canyons used dry panning to winnow out the gold, but the process was not efficient. Even so, the placer gold soon gave out. By 1870 the streambeds yielded little to prospectors and they sought easier working in the northern California fields.
