Gold in the Blue Cut and Beyond

Exploring Gold Deposits in the Cajon Pass

Along the historic route 66 in Cajon Pass is a narrow canyon known as Blue Cut. Local prospectors hotly debate how prevalent gold is available in the cut today, but there is no denying that nuggets and fine gold have been found there over the years. The seasonal creek is a steep hike down from the road leading to a peaceful and green area in a narrow gorge. This area is part of the Cajon Canyon and has been worked for gold since the early days of settlement in the region. The cut was formed by the Cajon Creek running through it and it has been a landmark for generations. Water levels in this creek varies from season to season with flash flooding possible. This ensures that fresh pickings are available in the cut as the creek is fed by many gold bearing tributaries and runs over sections of bedrock trapping the eroding pay dirt from higher elevations.

A marker was placed in 1994 at Blue Cut to commemorate the area's link to early mining efforts. This road system has a long history with the Holcomb mining areas, early settlements, the Mormon trail and as part of Indigenous trail systems. 

At one-point, large Mormon and Chinese camps were in the northern areas of the canyon. Ruins and occasional tokens of these populations can still be found off the beaten paths. These communities had extensive industrial mining operations in the surrounding areas. Tailing piles and arrastra mounds can be found alongside some of the ruins.



Cajon creek itself is mostly fed out of the Crowder Canyon area and is rich with heavy black sands. This canyon can be seen to the northern eastern side of the 15 freeway just before the CHP inspection station and again as a span of the Interstate 15 crosses it near the Cajon Summit. Most gold is small often in grain or wire forms as you get closer to the headwaters. Broad speculation is that the gold source is off the nearby Cleghorn Ridge. If you can find it, a book titled The Gold Hex by Ken Marguis follows the author's prospecting journey in Crowder Canyon.

Speculation and gossip hold that the best gold lies under 8-10 feet down in most areas making it difficult for the casual prospector. Online forums for local prospectors note that dealing with the high percentage of black sands can prove challenging.

Crowder Canyon was originally called Coyote Canyon after a horse thief named Chief Coyote who was killed there after stealing 400 cattle from a rancher in the southern mouth of Cajon Canyon in an area later known as Rancho Muscupiabe. Both the Old Spanish Trail and the Mormon Trial used this passage historically and it formed the backbone of early passages from the interior desert regions and San Bernardino areas.

As with many locations in the pass, this area is also home to a population of unhoused persons in addition to the natural cautions associated with prospecting. Take a prospecting buddy or two along to be safe. There are a few claims registered in the area as well. Be aware of your location and surroundings. Recent storms and the burned landscape may have opened up new paydirt for the adventurous miner.
