



Gold Prices Continue to Rise in 2024 New Gold Rush?

Gold prices have risen to historic levels increasing 29% by some estimates. Financial experts speculate that it could hit \$3,000 an ounce in early 2025. The lure of nature's gold won by individual sweat and persistence grows stronger just as it did for long ago gold seekers during California's Gold Rush. Social media is filled with images of gorgeous natural landscapes and gold nuggets quickly won with a few swirls of a gold pan. It is inevitable that Gold Fever will draw many more out to find their own lucky patch of ground. The USA Today news network reported that 10,373 new gold-bearing locations were found in California during 2023. Far more than any other state. Most of these new discoveries are too small for industrial mining interests to invest in working. Speculation is that a combination of forest fires and the return of heavy rains have opened up new deposits.
