

Coolgardie Mining District

Covering a vast portion of the American southwest and bridging three states, the Mojave Desert is far more than an empty wasteland that it is often portrayed in modern media. It is certainly dry, expansive, and certainly deadly, but it also offers a multitude of mineral resources luring the most adventurous of prospectors.

The Coolgardie Mining District is located to the northwest of Barstow, CA in the northern territory of the Mojave desert. It is to the west of the famous silver mining town of Calico founded in 1881. The nearby Rand Mining District was a heavy gold producer starting in

1895. The name, "Coolgardie" was a perhaps hopeful nod to the successful gold mining town of Coolgardie in Australia. Similar to its namesake, a lack of local water resources provided a major hurdle to mining operation.

Coolgardie is a dry placer mining region that draws on ancient riverbeds eroded from quartz veins to the northeast and east. The region saw its heyday between 1900-1915, but mining has never really ceased since that time. The humble dry washer and puffers reign supreme for modern miners. The area looks like a broad flat valley that is pocked marked with surface digging pits and holes to a labyrinth of underground tunnels chasing the best gravel deposits. The biggest mining operation was the Coolgardie Mining Company which had developed gas powered dry washers capable of processing up to 100 tons of material a day. Additional deposits of copper, silver, and even cinnabar have been reported nearby. Miners have noted that they do not see as much black sand in the Coolgardie deposit as much as you see in other ancient placer regions. The geology of this phenomenon is unclear. The source material has been speculated to be similar to a material called "quartz agate" by locals that is in a soft brown substrate of host rock. Ultimately, it is likely the mountainous source of this gold pocket has been long eroded away.

Metal detectors still find success in the region going over old workings from the early 1900's as larger gold would be rejected from the old timer's screen on the dry washers and rockers. As always, be safe and partner up before heading out. Snakes and abandoned mines are a constant hidden danger. For those adventurous enough to do a little exploring, this region is a hidden gem with many

All From AFMS Newsletter, Vol. 78, No. 8 **Pineapple Opals**

From The Opal Express, The American Opal Society, September 2025 Pineapple opals are pseudomorphs—minerals that have replaced another mineral while preserving the original crystal shape. In this case, opal replaces ikaite (a hydrated form of calcium carbonate).


- -Ikaite forms only under specific conditions low temperatures, high alkalinity, and elevated pressures—typically in deep marine or cold sedimentary environments.
- -Over time, as environmental conditions shift, the unstable ikaite decomposes and is replaced molecule by molecule by silica-rich fluids, forming opal.
- -The original crystal habit of ikaite, which features radiating spear-like formations, is preserved—resulting in the iconic spikey "pineapple" shape. Opal pseudomorphs are created by the deposition of opal in casts (molds) of fossil bone, teeth, shell, belemnoids (ancient relatives of cuttlefish), crinoids (sea lilies), wood, fir cones and even skeletons of large prehistoric animals. Many of these fossilized forms contain exceptional quality noble opal.

White Cliffs is the only place where these marvelous (and very rare) pseudomorphic opals have been found. White Cliffs is a small town in outback New South Wales in Australia, in Central Darling Shire. White Cliffs is around 255km northeast of Broken Hill, 93km north of Wilcannia. At the 2021 census, White Cliffs had a population of 156. To the objective observer White Cliffs is really a single purpose town. Miners started coming here (the local Aborigines found it far too hot for permanent settlement and occasionally visited the place as they traveled to and from the Darling River) in the 1880's and, apart from its minor function as a service centre for the surrounding properties, it remains a town driven by opals. The summer temperatures, typically over 40°C (104°F), forced the miners underground.

Pineapple Opals cont.

The 100 million years old sandstone conglomerate in which the opal seams were buried carried two advantages. It was remarkably stable (no one has ever died from a mine collapse in White Cliffs) and it was relatively easy to dig. By around 1900 miners were burrowing into the hills in an attempt to find opals and escape from the heat. The real way to see White Cliffs is from the air. It appears like a strange moonscape with an estimated 50,000 disused diaginas.

Fewer than a few hundred authentic pineapple opals have ever been documented, making them one of the rarest opal types on Earth. Their scarcity, combined with their bizarre and beautiful form, makes them highly coveted by mineral collectors and museums. Top specimens can command very high prices in the collector's market.


